

ANIMAL MANAGEMENT POLICY GUIDELINES

COMPLAINTS AND OFFENCES

- Council acknowledge the right for complainants to privacy and confidentiality of their identifying details.
- ii) Council reserves the right to request verifying information from complainants such as written records, statutory declarations or diary entries to provide supporting evidence prior to or during investigating a complaint. This information is to be treated in confidence and only released if authorised by the complainant or required by legal proceedings.
- iii) Acceptance and investigation of complaints where people are unwilling to provide specific details to Council to allow verification will be allocated a lower priority and may not be allocated resource for investigation if a resolution is unlikely to be achieved.
- iv) Wherever possible, owners of animals involved in an offence will be given educational material and a warning. Repeated failure to meet responsibilities, or when offences of a more serious or intentional nature are committed (e.g. threatening an officer, encouraging or allowing a dog attack etc) there will be no warning issued prior to taking action. Actions available to Council include the seizure and impoundment of dogs or livestock, issue of infringement notices or prosecution.

ALLEGED DOG ATTACKS

Please note that due to each incident's unique nature, steps may at times be taken out of this specific order if required.

- i. Council receives a phone call/correspondence regarding an alleged dog attack/harassment incident.
- ii. Council ensures that if the dog allegedly involved in the attack/harassment is out wandering at large, it is detained to ensure public safety. In case of serious attacks where there is a lack of confidence, the dog will not put the public in further danger. Council may seize the dog allegedly involved pending further investigation and may detain the dog for up to seven days before deciding the outcome upon the investigation.
- iii. Council undertakes an investigation of the site of the attack and gathers details of any witnesses.
- iv. Council obtains details from the complainant and arranges an interview. The complainant is required to write a formal statement to assist with the investigation.
- v. Council will request a formal statement from any witnesses to the alleged attack/harassment.

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- vi. Council attempts to determine ownership of dog involved in the alleged attack.
- vii. If the owner can be determined, Council allows the dog owner to be interviewed concerning the alleged attack/harassment.
- viii. Council undertakes further investigation as required, including obtaining photographs and medical/veterinary reports as evidence if available/applicable.
- ix. Council investigation officer provides Council management with a recommended course of action under Circular Head Council policy. A final decision is made on an outcome.
- x. Correspondence is sent to the dog owner allegedly involved in the attack/harassment, informing them of the Council's investigation's outcome, and enforcement action is undertaken if required.

DOGS AT LARGE

- I. Dog owners who have registered their dogs and have affixed a current registration tag to their dog will be provided the extra benefit of Council attempting to contact and return dogs to them in the first instance, rather than impoundment. Exceptions to this guideline are:
 - a. Another form of offence has been committed (e.g. dog attack).
 - b. Previous warnings have been ignored by the owner.
 - c. The owner could not be contacted.
- II. Where possible, if a dog's details or owners be known, they will be contacted to arrange collection of dogs reported missing or found roaming at large.
- III. Dogs surrendered or not claimed will be considered for re-homing. This will be organised through an approved animal welfare organisation. Suitability of the dog to be re-homed and the costs involved to Council will be considered when making this decision.

DANGEROUS DOGS

- I. Decisions around the declaration of dangerous dogs are taken on merit and are at the discretion of the delegated officer and made on the principle of protecting the community. Other options, which may be considered before a declaration include the voluntary surrender of the dog or alternative measures being implemented and committed to by the owner.
- II. The nature and severity of any incident will be considered during the decision-making process. In the interest of resolving these matters with urgency, Council officers, may negotiate an outcome which protects the community and avoids further expense to Council.

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DECLARED AREAS

- The decision to declare areas will be made based upon community needs and expectations.
 Dog management areas, if declared in Circular Head, will be listed in **Appendix B** of Animal Management Policy.
- II. Council will strive to uphold a fair balance within the community and the environment and in accordance with the *Dog Control Act 2000*, Council may declare and regulate parts of the municipality to be:

Dogs Off Lead (provided dogs are under effective control).

Dogs on Lead (Dogs on Lead at all times).

Dogs Prohibited (Dogs prohibited from entering other than guide/hearing dogs).

III. The declared areas are to be identified through a traffic light style colour system, as described below:

Green	Dogs Off Lead
Orange	Dogs On Lead
Red	Dogs Prohibited

- IV. Dogs Off Lead areas are allocated for the exercising of dogs off-leash so long as they remain under effective control. Use of Dogs Off Lead areas must be without exclusion, threat or inconvenience to other dogs. The owner or person in charge of the dog/s must immediately address aggressive or nuisance behaviour, excessive barking and remove any faeces.
- V. Dogs Prohibited areas are required for the protection of wildlife and native habitats by outlawing dogs within that zone. Other legislation may prohibit entry of dogs (for example National Parks).
- VI. Council will supply and maintain signage at appropriate access points to clearly identify declared areas.
- VII. Additionally, the *Dog Control Act 2000* prohibits dogs within the following areas:
 - (a) Any grounds of a school, preschool, crèche or other place where there is a presence of children, unless with the permission of the person in charge of the place.
 - (b) Any shopping centre or any shop unless a pet shop, veterinary surgery, pet grooming shop or other premises related to the care and management of dogs.
 - (c) The grounds of any swimming pool.

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- (d) Any playing area of a sportsground on which sport is being played.
- (e) Any area within 10 metres of a children's playground.

FEES

- I. Council determines an annual fee structure for dog management. Fees have been structured to positively incentivise dog registration including a discount period in the early part of the year. Cost recovery is not achieved.
- II. The fee structure is determined annually as part of Council setting an annual budget. Fees are published on the Council website www.circularhead.tas.gov.au.
- III. As a general principle, no refund to dog registration fees will be due if a dog requiring registration dies or relocates from the municipal area following its annual registration or licence renewal.

CAT MANAGEMENT

- I. Cat management is a State responsibility. Council will not provide cat management services and facilities. However, Council will encourage responsible cat ownership by promoting access to information offered by other service providers.
- II. Cat management action may be undertaken in declared areas including the humane destruction of cats found in these areas:
 - (a) Prohibited Areas Applies to land within the authority (ownership) of the Council
 - (b) Cat Management Areas Can be applied to any part of the Council area.
- III. Cat management and prohibited areas, if declared in Circular Head, will be listed in Appendix C of this policy.

LIVESTOCK MANAGEMENT

- I. Council will encourage responsible livestock management, including fencing of land to reduce the risk of livestock escaping and creating a danger to road users. Where necessary Council can apply statutory provisions to the fencing of land.
- II. The management of livestock by Council only becomes necessary if police need assists to remove livestock off the road and is a hazard to road users.
- III. As a last resort Council can impound stock in accordance with the *Local Government Act* 1993 and *Law of Animals Act* 1962.

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RESOURCE ALLOCATION

- I. Within the resources allocated, routine patrols and activities relating to dog management will be focussed on the most at-risk areas such as towns, beaches and settlements where there is a concentration of both people and dogs.
- II. Council will only provide an emergency after-hours dog management service in the following circumstances:
 - (a) If a dog attack occurs, provided that the alleged offending dog has been secured or remains in the immediate area.
 - (b) To collect dogs at large provided that the dog has been secured or remains in the immediate area and arrange collection for the next working day when practicable.
 - (c) Assist police if requested.

RESPONSIBILITY

The Manager Development and Regulatory Services is responsible for the overall management of this policy.

REVIEW

This Policy will be a reviewed a minimum of every 5 years in accordance with section 7 of the Dog Control Act 2000, with public input sought.



ANIMAL MANAGEMENT POLICY APPENDIX A – CODE FOR RESPONSIBLE DOG OWNERSHIP

APPENDIX A - CODE FOR RESPONSIBLE DOG OWNERSHIP

This Code for Responsible Dog Ownership is advisory and does not replace any obligation under any law relating to the ownership or care of the dog.

Responsible dog ownership requires a dog owner or the person responsible for a dog/s to accept full responsibility, for meeting all the care and attention needs of a dog/s and for ensuring the dog/s does not become a threat or nuisance to the safety or welfare of any other person or animal.

Dog owners should consider the following:

- a) Ensure that the size, breed and activity level of the dog that you wish to own is appropriate to your current circumstances.
- b) Ensure that the dog receives proper care and attention and is provided with sufficient exercise, health care, food, water and shelter.
- c) Seek advice when necessary on any aspect of dog ownership and care from appropriate information sources and professional bodies, including Veterinarian Surgeons.
- d) Ensure that your dog is effectively socialized and receives adequate training from a young age.
- e) Ensure that your dog wears an appropriate collar with a current registration tag attached and is microchipped. In the case of a working dog they do not have to be microchipped or have to wear a collar when engaged in work. A guide or hearing dog must wear the tag attached to the harness.
- f) Ensure that the dog is registered with Council when it reaches six (6) months of age.
- g) Notify Council of any change of ownership details, including the loss or death of the dog.
- h) Ensure that the dog is always kept under effective control and is confined to your property in your absence.
- i) Ensure that your dog does not foul any public place, or if it does, that the faeces is collected and appropriately disposed of.
- j) Take all reasonable steps to ensure that the dog does not cause a nuisance to any other person, whether by persistent and loud barking or howling or by any other means.
- k) Take all reasonable steps to ensure that the dog does not injure, endanger, intimidate or otherwise cause distress to any person or animal.

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ANIMAL MANAGEMENT POLICY APPENDIX A – CODE FOR RESPONSIBLE DOG OWNERSHIP

- I) Take all reasonable steps to ensure that the dog does not damage or endanger any property belonging to any other person.
- m) Take all reasonable steps to ensure that your dog is not provoked or encouraged to attack, menace, intimidate, harass, cause stress or discomfort to any person or animal whether in a public place or any person attending business on your property.
- n) Ensure that your dog is not allowed in any prohibited area or in a restricted area during restricted time frames.
- o) If you have no intention for your dog to breed, it is highly recommended to have that dog desexed before it reaches the age of 6 months.
- p) Apply for a kennel licence if more than two (2) dogs over the age of six months or four (4) working dogs are housed on the property.
- q) All dogs are subject to impoundment by being at large or pursuant to other action under 'The Act' and will be kept at Circular Head Council's pound facility.
- r) All dog owners must comply with the Dog Control Act 2000.

APPENDIX B – DECLARED AREAS (DOGS)

Under the state *Dog Control Act 2000* dogs must be on a lead when in public places unless in an area declared for the purpose of off lead exercise.

Even in an off-lead exercise area there are responsibilities that a dog owner has to meet.

These responsibilities include the owner having the dog in sight, in close proximity and responding to commands and making sure the dog will not rush at or chase other people or animals. Dog droppings must also be cleaned up. The *Dog Control Act 2000* defines this as having your dog under effective control.
